

Gail has organised everything for the Snakes and Ladders quilt so anybody who is willing can help to get the majority of the top made on this day. You can of course carry on with your own work. The hall was cold during the afternoon of the last SOS so make sure you are wearing something warm or have layers to put on. Hopefully the worst of the weather is over now....

The sign-up sheet has begun for Malvern but there are plenty of places so invite friends too. The cost will be £10 for members and £20 for non-members.

Sue told us about a request for pot-holders for the tombola at the Festival of Quilts in August which had been put out by Region 12 of the Quilters Guild. They need to be a specific size and they need to have insulation inside. Sue has an ironing board cover which she is going to cut and will distribute to anybody who is interested.

Charity Quilt—the voting has now finished for the design of the quilt for the raffle at the next show. I received 24 votes and the clear winner was the first design—Rapid City.

Visit to North Hampshire Quilters

Hazel writes:-

Six of us visited North Hampshire Quilters on the evening of February 8th following their invitation. We were given a warm welcome and shown to their meeting room in the Everest Community Academy not far from Basingstoke hospital. The group was formed in the 1970's and has over 60 members which come from a large area, and meet here twice a month, except August, in a large light filled room, seen below. Meetings usually take the form of a talk, sometimes a demonstration, with some show and tell. However once the business of the evening is over they finish, so there is little social aspect to the evening. They have 5 workshops/sewing days a year and a biennial exhibition, this year's being on March 3rd.

The evening started with show and tell from some of their members – quilts both pieced and appliqued, mostly traditional in style. When we arrived we were brought a trolley for our quilts which had to go up in a lift, so we don't know how many they expected! Amongst our exhibits were some of the most recent block of the month quilts, Somerset patchwork cushions, wall hangings, bags and quilts some of which had resulted from workshops, so we were able to showcase a good selection of work from our members. Their members seemed to appreciate them and ones we spoke to were most effusive in their praise. Hopefully we can invite them back at some time.

They also make premmie quilts for Basingstoke hospital and have 100 waiting to deliver!



Beverley explained how she had done matchstick quilting and also the freehand rotary cutting which she had used on her Dizzy Rascals quilt. Some of their members were quite interested but some were quite taken aback at the idea!

Pauline also writes:-

Our visit last month to North Hampshire Quilters was very enjoyable. Their meeting place is a large room in a very modern and busy community centre. Upon arrival there was even a trolley at hand which was used to transport our bags upstairs in a lift. We were warmly welcomed by their chair and other members of which there were many.

Their group is much larger than ours; I think their membership list is around seventy. After the business part of the meeting their members had a Show and Tell which was very interesting and then it was our turn! We had not really formalised how our Show and Tell would run but in the end we all got involved. For example Cheryl spoke about the various sewing machines she used and showed some lovely work which was very well received as was the work shown by Jenny Saady. Bev's contribution was very lighthearted and humorous as she spoke about how sometimes things don't always turn out as expected. The audience were particularly interested in her hand quilting. Linda also showed some of her super work . There were lots of other items shown and thank you to everyone who sent examples of their work. Throughout our Show and Tell there were lots of questions from the audience about the items shown and they spent a lot of time afterwards looking closely at our work. On the journey home we were all agreed that it had been a very worthwhile and enjoyable visit.

Bag Handle Demonstration

Geraldine has accumulated a number of books and magazines which have ideas for making bags in them and these will be available for inspiration throughout the year.

She has also collected bags of her own which demonstrate various types of handles. The ones she showed this month all had fabric handles ...



This is an example of how to use D Rings to make an adjustable strap.



This handle appears to be part of the top band of the bag but there is in fact a seam just above the curve which gives a neat finish



This embroidered silk bag will have a handle made with a thick cotton cord covered with fabric. It has been turned through in the same way that you would turn through a Rouleau loop.



This bag which was made from a kit has an asymmetric handle with some stiffener inside which has then been reinforced with lines of stitching.

Many thanks to Geraldine for the organisation she is putting in to these demonstrations.



Sue was also able to show us the webbing handle on her sloth bag which shows another form of fabric handle
