# **October Meeting**

I unfortunately missed this meeting but Sue has taken some photos for the newsletter.

A new member was welcomed, another Jenny, who is a returning member. She brought a jolly pumpkin quilt to show



so is an experienced quilter.

The Snakes and Ladders quilt for the 2020 exhibition has been basted using the long-arm quilter at Juberry. This is much easier than crawling around on the floor if your quilt is too big to go on a table and you are willing to pay to use the facility. It was suggested that this is a good way to experience and learn how to use a long-arm quilter and it could lead to doing more ambitious custom quilting on your own work in the future.

Another suggestion for this quilt is that it be used for a Silent Auction at the quilt show ( with a set lowest offer) so that it goes to an individual or group who will use it with children. We will still have another large quilt to raffle to raise money for a charity.

Another idea from the committee is that we produce a small booklet of patchwork and quilting tips which could be sold at the exhibition or be available for new members to the group. More information at a later date.....

The theme for next years activities will be reinforcing basic skills and giving advice and ideas on how these could be extended and utilised.

# **Show and Tell**

# **Activity**

A Halloween activity had been organised . Various fabrics



and themed shapes had been sorted so that members could choose a panel to bond and stitch as they liked. These will then be pieced at a later date and the resulting small quilt can be displayed at the exhibition.

## **Club Day**

Another bi-annual Club Day was held on Saturday with two visiting speakers telling us about their quilting lives.

**Kate Findlay** is a textile designer and an art teacher at a school in Oxfordshire. Her talk was titled **Working in Series** as she has found that she is not content with making just one piece of work on a theme but likes to experiment with variations on it. The series she told us about were Henley, Birds and the Hadron Collider...

The first had been done with schoolchildren who each made a Henley building that she collaged into a large wall-hanging which then won a cup at Malvern. This inspired her to get back to her own textile work and a series based upon life in Henley was created. By presenting her work framed and glazed she found that it was easier to sell it in an art gallery or exhibition.

She joined the Contemporary Quilters Guild and her next series, birds, was done for a Journal Quilts Challenge—i.e. one per month. She has produced a book of the designs along with Linda Seward who is an ornithologist as well as a quilter. Kates designs of hares and landscapes can also be found on cushions, tea towels and greetings cards. Through doing this she has learnt to produce designs which can be replicated either as an oblong or cropped as a square—a useful tip for anybody going down this route.



She uses sketch books to work on her ideas and makes paper templates on tracing paper which can be easily flipped and overlapped to work out her designs. She also uses a lot of hand dyed fabrics so that there is no problem about infringing the copyright of another designers fabric when images are being reproduced.

Much of her work was bonded and stitched, not quilted, so when she embarked on the Hadron Collider Series for the CQG she sought advice from her mother. The designs were inspired by a set of photographs of the huge machinery used underground at CERN to investigate black holes, atoms etc. She does not have a scientific background, she was just moved to produce a series of work based upon the circular designs. Her first work used a variety of fabrics, 3D elements and found objects but she soon realised that these were difficult to store and transport. Some of the work involves quilting which adds another set of pattern and texture. Other work is experimental with fabric bonded onto card in



order to make 3D elements; use of shiny PVC fabrics; couched wires; beads and a grid of ribbons which gave perspective inspired by the work of Escher .

Her later Aurora series includes LED lights and fibre optics and she is presently working on a series based on the silicon chip.

She finished by recommending an IPad design programme called ProCreate (I think) as it was so easy to use photographed images of fabrics and design elements in order to play around with ideas.

She left leaving all of us amazed and some of us inspired.

The afternoon speaker was **Catherine Lawes** who was born in New Zealand but has spent many years in Eastbourne UK. Her talk was called **From Here to There and Back Again** as it was inspired by both countries.

She was trained as an architect and has used her creative skills to try all kinds of needlework from collectable teddy bears to patchwork opera coats.



She has used aerial photographs of landscapes and symbols from ancient cultures in her work as well as rock formations. In New Zealand the city of Auckland is built on a volcano hotspot and she tried to create the emotional feeling of being caught in an earthquake. She found that it was not understood in the UK where her work was admired for the colours and stitching only....







Catherine also works with woollen threads and Faux Felting where the woollen design is overlaid with a clear soluble sheet which can be stitched through and then soaked off.

She finished by donning a series of patchwork and quilted coats and giving us a twirl. The first featured the Koru, one of the traditional New Zealand motifs used throughout her work, the unfurling fern symbolising New Beginnings. Another was inspired by the colourful work of the architect Freidrich Konderbus



and another blue, green and yellow watery design had been painted after the pieces had been cut and quilted then made up into the garment.

Having worn some of these coats while out and about she now has a sideline in making Opera Coats which has helped to use up some of her stash....

Another very interesting speaker to inspire us. Her work needed to be seen up close to appreciate the stitching and symbolism within them but she was very willing to let her work be handled, photographed and even worn!

Many thanks who everybody who helped out on the day and who contributed food for the delicious lunch.

Thank you also to the two traders who laid out their wares. Purple Stitches from Basingstoke and Quilters Dream from

Andover laid out heir wares to tempt everybody to add to their stash. There was a good contrast between the bright colours offered by Viv from Purple Stitches and the more traditional and muted designs which Ricky and Janet from Quilters Dream had on offer.

In all a very successful day.
