March Meeting

Sandra welcomed everybody to the meeting and introduced a new member, Elaine, to the group. Three of the new members were given kits to make up name badges and the rest of the group were asked to wear their badges at meetings while we all get to learn each others names.

SOS 6th April St George's Hall

A reminder was given about the SOS day on 6th April which will be a teaching session on Quilt As You Go for which it is advisable to have some quilted blocks ready to join together by whichever method you choose. Sue gave out a printed sheet last month which gave guidance on how much extra fabric to leave for joining etc.

Members can of course do their own work or make premmie quilts.

PAT testing will also be included on this day at a cost of £5 for up to 5 items. Members need to be aware that in order to comply with the insurance requirements of St George's I and St Francis Halls, all electrical items used for workshops need to be tested annually. The main items which will need doing are sewing machines and extension cables which are over one year old.

In order to comply with hall hire regulations, an emergency evacuation was practiced. This was done quickly and efficiently so we were not outside in the cold for too long.

Show and Tell



This quilt was made from a Moda 'Quilt in a Tin' kit. One of the main advantages of using a kit is that fabric colours have been selected to tone and blend perfectly.



The card templates needed to make up this sewing box came as a kit. The advantage here is that the pieces are all perfectly cut and the weight of cardboard is ideal for the job.



This bag with all of its embroidery, flaps, buttons and overlapping panels was made from a kit but is an example of a very appealing kit which is actually very fiddly to make up!



Although many kits seem expensive, they are a good way of learning new techniques without making mistakes and wasting fabrics.

If you are a person who likes to make their own fabric selections or use up fabric from your impulsively bought stash (that's me) then they do not have the same appeal.

An alternative would be to buy a pattern, which can also seem expensive, but you are paying for someone else's design, fabric quantity calculations, method of working etc. which is where many pitfalls can be made when trying to go it alone.

A cautionary tale though—I bought a pattern for a whole cloth cot quilt and found that it had been printed askew. I ended up having to re-draft the template. However, in doing so I decided to change the central design to make it more my own so I was pleased with it in the end.

I also remember somebody's tale of buying a pattern and then finding that it had been translated, not very well, from Japanese.

Kits are generally a safe way of achieving a pleasing quilt but probably not the cheapest way.

A lot of quit shops produce their own kits and if you go to quilt shows and workshops they are available straight form the designers.



The above quilt was made by new member, Lorraine and she managed to make it secretly for her daughters 18th birthday.

The red/pink square in the centre of the log cabin blocks is very traditional.



Bev has been very busy making premmie quilts, using up some of the ribbons and braids from her Mother's stash. She had also tried out a new technique called 'continuous chevrons' and then used it to make up a cushion. She says it is very good for using up bits...

There is youtube video by Victoria Findlay Wolfe who has developed the technique and produced a book.



Jean had made these very colourful premmie quilts



and new member Angie had made up this pink one.



Tulip mini-workshop

At a recent quilt show I bought some colourful tulips so I took one apart to see how they had been made . They were quite easy so I made up some kits and a pattern so that members could have a go during the evening.

They are based on a plastic drinking straw so that



got a few more out of circulation. Most people were able to completed their tulip within an hour and then had the pattern to take home in case they wanted to make more.

Veronica brought in the tulips which she had made. They are a more complex version which had multiple petals so show that this basic idea could be developed. In fact she brought in the book which she had taken the design from and it had roses, sweet peas, sunflowers and many more flower designs to make.
