## Facemasks

I know that there is a great debate about whether home made facemasks do more harm than good but as long as you understand that they will not prevent you from catching Coronavirus then they could have a place....

Hayfever season is almost here so that means runny noses and sneezing for some. A facemask would prevent spraying droplets, which may unknowingly spread the virus, into the atmosphere. Children have ordinary colds, I sneeze whenever I go in to bright sunshine.....

A google search will take you to various sites on how to make one but the one I used was

You need three layers of cotton fabric, a decorative one for the front, a different one so that you know which is the inside and a closely woven fabric for the centre. I used a piece of high thread count cotton sheeting but flannel will also do.

Large 7" x 10"

Med 6" x 9"

Small 5" x 7"

The adult ones can have a piece of elastic which hooks over the ears. I made mine 7" which was a little bit big for me but everyone has a different sized head so they may need a tuck in them to make them snug. For a small child you can make four ties from strips 1 1/2" wide.

I also inserted a piece of plastic coated garden wire (with the ends turned over with pliers) across the top of the adult sized ones which can be squeezed to go over the nose. This is trapped in place by the topstitching on the edges. (a pipecleaner might do the same job). I don't know how this will wash and maybe I should have made a slot so that it could be removed for washing. However.....

These can only be worn once and should then be treated as if they are contaminated—as soon as you get home they should be immersed in boiling water and your hands thoroughly washed before touching anything else. Take them off your face by taking hold of one piece of elastic and easing them off.

If you want to take them off as you come out of the supermarket, for instance, they can be carefully dropped into a plastic bag which can then be sealed until you get home.  Stich right sides together leaving a gap to turn through and trapping the elastic or ties into the sides.



- Turn through, close the gap and top stitch all the way round enclosing the wire if using.
- Make two pleats on each side and top stitch in place.

I found that the thickness of the layers was difficult for the machine to get through during the making of the pleats and had to stitch them by hand. This will depend upon your machine and the fabric used.

If you use a steam iron during the making up process this will sterilise the fabric to a certain degree.

Anyway, make of this what you will. I have made them for my grandchildren and have said that if nothing else they can be used for role-playing doctors and nurses!

This is what I have been up to lately -

This quilt was made for a little boy who was born in mid December (spot the Christmas tree) who loves animals.





A Double T block from the quilt I am working on now using Voysey fabrics from the V&A.



My hand quilting project is nearly complete—a strippy quilt which is a traditional North Country design for a baby in Cumbria.

Yes, I should have taken Pat's advice and used a frame!
